## CHINESE TROOPS OF 2 FACTIONS **LOOT SHANGHAI**

People at Mercy of Soldiers of Victor and Vanguished

## GENERAL CHI IS

Invaders of French Settlement FLORA A. LOOMIS Are Disarmed Without Any Trouble

Shanghai, Jan. 12 .- (By The A. P.) -Both victor and vanquished in yes terday's coup, by which Chi Hsieh Yuan, deposed military governor of (Kiangsu) province. this (Kiangsu) province, regained control of Shanghai, united this morn-

ing in an orgy of looting.

The soldiery, both of General Chi. whose attack was a defiance directed at the provincial government in Peking, and of the defending forces led by the Peking appointee, Chang Yungnative city, which adjoins on south the French settlement here.

Native merchants and householders in that region today were frantical'y removing their possessions into the protected foreign quarters, in defense which the volunteer corps, com-sing most of the foreigners in prising Shanghai, had been called out.

The volunteer corps, Chinese merchants and members of the Chinese Fire Fighting brigade was this afternoon making futile efforts to cope with the unrestrained soldiery.

Several bands of soldiers which penetrated within the boundaries of the French settlement, which was nearest the scene of the looting, were disarmed without difficulty and many
